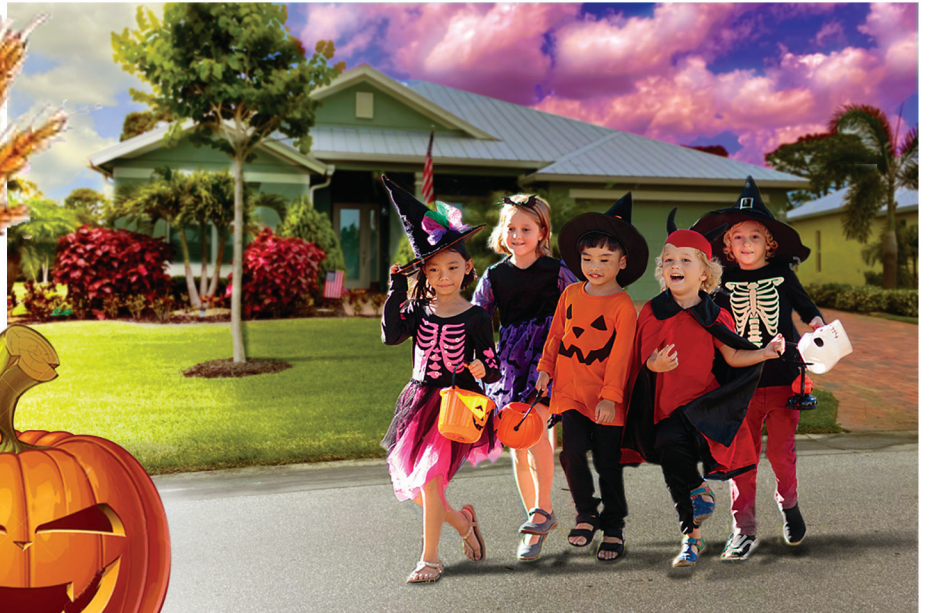

HALLOWEEN HAUNTINGS ABOUND IN FLORIDA!

Saint Augustine was founded in 1565, and considered the oldest city in the United States. Saint Augustine has also



earned a reputation as the most haunted city in Florida. One of the most legendary haunted sites in St. Augustine happens to be the 165 foot-tall St. Augustine Lighthouse, which was constructed in

1874 and features 219 spiral steps to the top. Some visitors to the haunted lighthouse have reported hearing children's laughter and footsteps (two teenaged children of a lighthouse worker reportedly drowned in the adjacent bay in the late 1800s). While others have heard mysterious voices, smelled cigar smoke, viewed a shadowy figure at the top of the lighthouse and/or run into the so-called "Man in Blue" in the basement of the former lighthouse keeper's house.

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Beachside Goblins, Ghouls & Ghosts

Indian River Hauntings is a live event experience that guides guests through a paranormal adventure—applying investigative techniques, explorative gadgetry, historical facts and ghostly stories for a hands-on search for the unexplained. Owner and ghost hunter, Larry Lawson, believes that when investigating paranormal locations and historical structures, it is just as critical to gather and preserve empirical evidence to support the existence of worlds and entities beyond the norm. Educated, well-adjusted people have claimed to have experienced inexplicable events—hinting that there may be a dimension that some ascend to after leaving this existence. Lawson notes that there is evidence of nu-

merous hauntings throughout IRC—particularly at the historic Fellsmere School, Marsh Landing Restaurant, and many of Vero's landmark buildings built by Waldo Sexton, including the popular Driftwood Resort, and Sexton's home (known today as Waldo's Secret Garden). Waldo was a world traveler and a passionate collector. Treasured antiques, weaponry, and art,

are a large part of his decorative appeal. Waldo was especially fond of bells—amassing a collection of 250 types and sizes—many on display at the Driftwood Resort. It is said the ringing was a welcome to guests on their arrival and a farewell on their departure. It seems that Mr. Sexton, who died in 1967 at age 82, is still a presence at his beloved oceanside

inn. Guests have heard noises coming from rooms that once were part of the original Sexton house, called Breezeway, where, on his rounds, a security guard claims he felt a tap on his shoulder only to turn and discover an empty hallway. Some say they often hear the clang of bells late at night. Perhaps a nearby wind chime... or a message from beyond the grave.

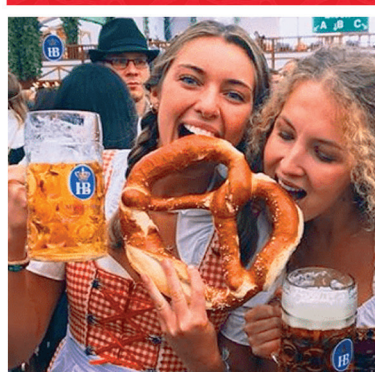

As Summer transitions to Fall, we reflect on a remarkable youth sailing season culminating a winning effort by by our local YSF team. Junior sailors Alex Delamater (13), Skyler Dussan (12), and Ashton Evers (13) sailed in the 2022 Optimist National Championship on the famous Columbia River Gorge in Oregon. Over two hundred of the best junior sailors from all over the United States competed for the honor of representing the United States on the National Optimist Team. YSF's racing coach, Roberto Ayala prepared the team with a grueling six-week bootcamp on the Indian River Lagoon. YSF's Alex Delamater's score earned him an invitation to the final selection regatta in the Spring of 2023.

YSF is a non-profit providing free sailing instruction to the children of Indian-River County. Founded in 2009 by Charlie Pope, the mission is to use sailing to build character and provide the

basic building blocks for a successful life. Sailing requires focus, perseverance and resilience. Success builds confidence and self-esteem allowing the child to achieve their full potential. Alex personifies what can be achieved. The young man is not only a great sailor, but thoughtful and eloquent beyond his years.
