THE TOP 10 SIGNS Of Fall in Florida

A medieval match that's endured the test of time...

The evil, green-skinned witch flying on her magic broomstick may be a Halloween icon—and a well-worn stereotype. But the actual history behind how witches came to be associated with such an everyday household object is anything but dull. From or brooms in the light of the full moon to the beginning, brooms were associated primarily with women, and this ubiquitous household object became a powerful symbol of female domesticity.

Despite this, the first witch to confess to riding a broom was a man: Guillaume Edelin. Edelin was a priest from Saint-Germain-en-Laye, near Paris. He was arrested in 1453 and tried for witchcraft after publicly criticizing the church's warnings about witches. His confession came under torture, and he eventually repented but was still imprisoned for life. By the time of Edelin's "confession," the idea of witches riding around on broomsticks was already well established.

The earliest known image of witches on brooms dates to 1451, when two illustrations appeared in the French poet Martin Le Franc's manuscript Le Champion des Dames (The Defender of Ladies). In the two drawings, one woman soars through the air on a broom; the other flies aboard a plain white stick. Both wear headscarves that identify them as Waldensians, members of a Christian sect founded in the 12th century who were branded as heretics by the Catholic Church, partly because they allowed women to become priests.

Anthropologist Robin Skelton suggests the association between witches and brooms may have roots in a pagan fertility ritual, in which rural farmers would leap and dance astride poles, pitchforks encourage the growth of their crops. This "broomstick dance," she writes, became confused with common accounts of witches flying through the night on their way to orgies and other illicit meetings.

Beginning in the 17th century, accounts of witches using broomsticks to fly up and out of chimneys became more commonplace, even as women became more closely associated with the household and domestic sphere. According to one custom, women would prop a broom up outside a door, or place it up a chimney, to let others know they were away from the home. Perhaps because of this, popular legend embraced the idea that witches left their houses through their chimneys, even though very few accused witches ever confessed to doing so.

Popular anxiety about witchcraft had subsided by the 18th century. Although there are still plenty of self-identified "witches" in the United States today, thanks to the growth of neo-pagan religious traditions like Wicca, few of them claim to be taking to the skies aboard their trusty brooms. But the image of witches flying on broomsticks endures—especially on Halloween.



CARVING

First Things First. Let the turkey rest for a good 30 minutes. This allows the juices to redistribute within the meat, which means more juice in your turkey than on your cutting board.

First, slice off the legs and thighs. To do this, slice through the skin between the leg and the breast. Then pull back on the leg, laying it flat outward, and push up on the joint from underneath. You may hear a slight pop. At that point, use your knife to cut around the joint and remove the leg and thigh completely. Repeat this process on the other side and set these pieces aside.

Remove the breast meat. Slice down on either side of the breast bone, using long strokes. As your knife hits the bottom, use your thumb to gently pull the breasts outward, continuing to slice down and out until the breast meat is removed. If needed, you can slice horizontally at the bottom of the breast from the outside to help remove it. Repeat this process on the other side.

Remove the wings. Gently pull the wings away from the body and slice through the joint to remove it. You can remove the wing tips (there's really no meat here), and they're second, use a very sharp knife to keep the great for stocks. Then set the wings aside.

POINTERS ... that cut to the chase

Separate the drumstick from the thigh. Now that all the meat is removed from the turkey, flip this piece over so it's skin side down, and you can see the natural separation between the drumstick and the thigh. Slice through the meat and gently pull back on the drumstick to expose the joint, then slice through it.

Remove the bone from the thigh. Use your knife to slice around the thigh bone, preserving as much meat as possible. Slice up the meat. First, slice against the grain for tender pieces of meat. And skin attached to each piece.
